#### Letter from the President

# **SBDC Updates**

SBDC work traditionally increases in the spring and 2023 is no exception. Of the 76 initial new clients in the first half of the year, 42 were in the second quarter. Additionally, the SBDC worked with a total of 132 clients in the first half of the year with 78 of those receiving services in the second quarter. We have been on this trajectory for the past few years and see no signs of slowing down in the business activities of our community.

With market conditions tightening, and cost of capital

rising, we are beginning to see national discussion on slowing of borrowing, and locally this is true as well. With interest rates hitting values not seen in many years, it is important to note that we are now operating in a "normal" business environment. With fluctuations happening, and interest expense a much larger factor, business owners are again looking for creative solutions to grow and expand in our area.

Our focus has continued this year in serving our entire county, and reaching all areas equally. We are proud of the success of our entire county, and the businesses we consult, and look forward to a robust second half of the year in 2023!



# The Forge Updates

Second quarter of 2023 saw full construction focus at the Forge, with all rough framing completed, and electrical and mechanical taking shape throughout the facility. Incubator spaces took shape in phase 2, along with the artist space and common areas being identified and built out. Grand Opening of phase 1 is set for middle of August, and we are on track for this to be completed. Equipment is being ordered and arriving as quickly as possible, with more being identified as the process develops.



Our externs, representing IASC Next Career Pathways, have been busy commissioning equipment, and assisting with identifying additional items that are needed. Layouts of the education and entrepreneur spaces are being completed, potential users are visiting to see the space, and we are excited for all the new possibilities this space is bringing to Itasca County.

# 4-6-2023: Attract Me. Employ Me. Retain Me. Workforce Summit

How do you attract your employees? Furthermore, how do you employ and then retain them? The Attract Me, Employ Me, and Retain Me Workforce Summit was held on April 6 at the Timberlake event center. 
This initiative was developed to embody the concept of seamlessly integrating traditional education with practical, hands-on experiences that are deeply connected to real-world workforce opportunities.



# **Innovate 218 Updates**

We are so thrilled to announce that Northspan will be taking the helm of Innovate 218! IEDC was awarded the grant in late 2020 to be the hub of the LAUNCH initiative to boost up the entrepreneurial ecosystem in NE Minnesota. It was decided that we would tackle serving 9 counties by offering to pay the tuition of our regions entrepreneurs who wanted to take part in a virtual 10-week cohort which would assist them in creating a lean business canvas to help them iterate out their business ideas.

Our fourth cohort ended late April and we were able to look at the data. Each county indeed did have entrepreneurs who took part in this momentum! Ninety-three NE Minnesota entrepreneurs are better poised to tackle business ownership because of our collaboration with ILT academy, who taught the 10-week cohort. Many networking events also facilitated a better understanding among our professional colleagues in the area to help build onto this momentum. All this networking has provided a greater understanding of what each entity does to be able to better serve

It has been an honor to start this program- set the tone of what LAUNCH is trying to create with these funds and watch the entrepreneurs get into the wide array of services available to them within Minnesota.

# **APEX Updates**

Regional Site Readiness: Being Proactive for Future Development Opportunities

#### The Process

Regional economic development efforts are essential to the success of Itasca County and the APEX region. By working together, multiple partners can support site identification, evaluation, and ranking of sites from best to worst. This process can be complex, but it is essential to ensure that the region and individual locals are able to attract and retain businesses and jobs.

The first step in the process is to identify potential sites for development. This can be done by conducting a site survey, which will identify ownership and physical characteristics of the site, such as its location and size. The survey will also identify any environmental or other constraints such as easements and encumbrances, that may affect the development of the site.



Once potential sites have been identified, they need to be evaluated. The evaluation will consider factors such as the site's location, access to transportation, and environmental impact. The criteria to determine suitability for the proposed use includes logistical assets like highways, rail, ports and access to infrastructure like adequate power, water, sewer and broadband, as well as its potential impact on the communities and Sovern Nations in the surrounding area.

The final step is to rank the sites from best to worst using a ranking matrix developed on known and estimated criteria. This is done based on the results of the site survey and evaluation. The highest-ranked sites will be those that are most suitable for the proposed development/use and have the least impact on the surrounding area and cost to develop.

#### The Importance of Economic Development Efforts

Economic development efforts can be a complex process, but they are essential to the success of any community or region. By working together, multiple partners can support site identification, evaluation, and ranking of sites from best to worst. Focusing our effort and financial resources on the best site opportunities for development is an important part of business attraction, retention and job creation.

In addition to the steps outlined above, there are several other factors that need to be considered when undertaking regional economic development efforts. These include:

- · Availability of skilled labor
- · Cost of living
- · Quality of life
- · Availability of infrastructure
- · Regulatory environment

By taking all of these factors into account, regional and local economic development efforts can be more successful in attracting and retaining businesses and jobs. APEX and IEDC, with the support of many regional partners, are currently reviewing 13 newly identified sites ranging from 40 to 200 acres in Itasca County for future business attraction and expansion efforts.

By being proactive and taking the necessary steps to ensure regional site readiness, Itasca County and the APEX region can position themselves for success in the years to come.

# **Entrepreneur Fund Updates**

We've doubled down on our commitment to serving the region's entrepreneurs by <u>strategically growing our</u> <u>organization and leadership capacity</u>. We've grown because you've grown!

And that growth is evident in Itasca County. Through the combination of small business loans and strategic advising, EFund has supported the growth of 49 businesses and invested \$1.2 million in Itasca County so far this year!
